



Sports Premium Funding and Swimming and Water Safety Report 2019-2020

The following document has two sections. The first section describes the allocation of the sports premium funding allocated to the school in the academic year of 2019-2020. The second document is a swimming and water safety report for the same academic year.

Sports Premium Report 2019-2020

What is the Sports Premium?

The Government continues to provide funding of £150 million per annum for academic to provide new, substantial primary school sport funding'. This funding is being jointly provided by the Departments for Education, Health and Culture, Media and Sport, and will see money going directly to primary school head teachers to spend on improving the quality of sport and PE for all their children.

The sport funding can only be spent on sport and PE provision in schools.

For the academic year 2019 – 2020 the school will receive funding in order to provide better opportunity for the pupils within the primary phase.

Funding for the academic year of 2019-2020 seen schools with 17 or more eligible pupils receive £16,000 and an additional payment of £10 per pupil, therefore meaning that Alderman Knight School will receive **£16, 330**

Possible uses for the funding include:

- hiring specialist PE teachers/qualified sports coaches to work alongside primary teachers when teaching PE
- new or additional sport clubs
- paying for professional development opportunities in PE/sport
- providing cover to release primary teachers for professional development in PE/sport
- running sport competitions, or increasing participation in the school games
- providing places for pupils on after school sport clubs and holiday clubs

In order to achieve this statement we planned to use the additional money to



- Provide a clear & structured PE curriculum which is consistent & sustainable.
- To improve the quality & consistency of provision of PE & help improve staff confidence in their delivery in order to improve levels and standards.
- To develop physical activity and play both within the school curriculum and during non-structured play time.
- To develop sustained daily physical activity through the use of the daily mile.
- Provide continued swimming support to allow all pupils to access high quality swimming lessons in a dedicated environment in order to enhance physical activity participation and deliver a wider breadth of swimming experiences including life-saving and competition, through the use of level 2 trained swimming coach.

Due to the UK Government forcing a national lockdown on Monday 23rd of March 2020, closing schools for the majority of pupils, many objectives were unable to be met. The government have recognised this and have revised the conditions on when the sports premium funding needs to be spent by.

The Education and Skills Funding Agency published the following information on the gov.uk website.

As a result of the coronavirus (COVID-19) outbreak, the Department for Education took steps to relax the ring-fencing arrangements for the PE and sport premium in the 2019 to 2020 academic year to allow any unspent grant to be carried forward into the 2020 to 2021 academic year.

Any under-spends carried forward will need to be spent in full by 31 March 2021 and schools should factor this into spending plans for their 2020 to 2021 PE and sport premium allocation.

With this available information and as you can see from the table below, many of the objectives set out to be completed in the academic year of 2019-2020 will aim to be completed in the 2020-2021 academic year.

The table below has set out the key indicators and the actions involved which were created in the previous academic year of 2018-2019. An update has been provided regarding the progress of these and the actions involved. If they haven't been achieved, then these will continue to be a priority to be achieved before 31st March 2021.

Out of the budget of 2018-2019 £14892 was carried over into the 2019-2020 budget.

Physical Education Swimming and Water Safety Report for the Academic Year 2019- 2020

Swimming Opportunities Offered in the Academic Year of 2019-2020

Below is a table of the groups who attended swimming for the 2019-2020 academic year. This includes Primary, key-stage three and key-stage four groups.

Due to Covid-19 and national lockdown on 23rd of March 2020, groups who were scheduled to attend swimming after this date unfortunately did not get the opportunity to attend swimming. These groups were 3H (KS3 group – 9 pupils) and 3L (KS3 group – 11 pupils).

Primary Swimming Report

The National Curriculum states that all schools must provide swimming instruction either in key stage 1 or key stage 2 as part of their physical education offer.

In particular, pupils should be taught to:

- swim competently, confidently and proficiently over a distance of at least 25 metres
- use a range of strokes effectively [for example, front crawl, backstroke and breaststroke]
- perform safe self-rescue in different water-based situations.

Due to the significant needs of pupils at Alderman Knight School these objectives could be considered unrealistic for some pupils at the school however, this report will present numbers and percentages of pupils whose school year was year 6 in the academic year of 2019-2020. Even though all pupils included in the report did not meet the expected standards they had many




opportunities to access swimming on a weekly basis to gain awards in swimming dependent on their own ability.

It is important to note that on the 23rd of March 2020, the United Kingdom went into complete lockdown due to Covid-19. Swimming was then subsequently cancelled for the remainder of the academic year. This will have an effect on the number of pupils achieving the objectives set out in the national curriculum.

Below is a table presenting the national curriculum objectives for swimming. The total number of year 6 pupils in academic year 2019-2020 at Alderman Knight School was 13.

It is important to note that pupils only swam until March 2020 and missed 4 months of swimming due to lockdown.
What percentage of the year 6 cohort from academic year 2019-2020 use a range of strokes effectively?	10	76.9%	Swimming has been introduced on a weekly rather than a fortnightly basis and these figures demonstrate that swimming weekly certainly increases the number of pupils meeting the national curriculum standards. The sports premium funding has enabled us to complete swimming on a weekly basis and if we want to see these percentages increase then we need to continue to fund weekly swimming lessons for primary pupils at Alderman Knight School.
What percentage of the year 6 cohort from academic year 2019-2020 perform safe self-rescue in different water-based situations?	5	38.5%	



How has the PE and Sport Premium fund been used for swimming and water safety?

Schools are able to use the Primary PE and Sport premium fund to provide additional provision for swimming however, this must be for activities which are over and above the national curriculum requirements.

In previous years all primary classes used to attend swimming as one group, meaning a larger range of pupils at the swimming pool which became too difficult to manage and teach with limited number of teachers and space in transport. In the previous academic year pupils only attended on a fortnightly basis. This made it difficult for pupils to make progress regularly as the period of time between lessons were too long and a large amount of time was spent revisiting skills which had already been taught. It was agreed that these pupils needed a regular weekly swimming session so they were able to make continued progress, making swimming a meaningful experience for the pupils.

In the academic year of 2019-2020, Alderman Knight School increased the number of swimming sessions for primary aged pupils to one session per week rather than previously one per fortnight. Two younger primary groups would attend swimming lessons on a Wednesday between break and lunch and then a further two classes would attend after lunch until the end of the school day.

The figures above suggest that if lockdown and covid-19 didn't cancel the swimming sessions, there would be an argument that more pupils would have achieved the national curriculum targets for swimming in year 6. This was only made possible by swimming lessons being available on a weekly basis and if this did not happen then it could be considered that the percentages would be lower.

The aim is to continue this into the academic year of 2020-2021 however due to Covid-19 no swimming is planned to take place until January 2021 where the risk assessment will be revised.
